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### FROM PASTOR JOEL

Dear Friends in Christ,

Every year, in the middle of Advent, I write a letter reminding you that December is the month when more guests decide to go "church shopping" than any other. The second most likely time to meet newcomers in worship is whatever month Easter falls in. The pattern is obvious. For anyone baptized and raised in a Christian congregation, Christmas and Easter still feel magnetic. Both days still create a powerful "pull" that draws newcomers to the doors of local churches.

Most pastors have figured out that ridiculing "CEO's" - Christmas and Easter Only - is a losing strategy if hospitality is the gift we want to share with our newest neighbors. Over the years, I have come to see Christmas, Easter, and the beginning of the school year as gifts from God that the Holy Spirit still uses to draw Christians who have slipped out of the orbit of a local church to congregations that want to love them, nurture their faith, and invest their gifts in loving service.

As we get ready for the Sunday before Christmas and Christmas Eve, let me remind you that we all have important work to do. Preachers must prepare the best sermons we can create - messages of hope that are faithful to Scripture and meaningful to contemporary listeners. Musicians must also be faithful to their disciplines, investing the time and talents God has given to them to learn the pieces chosen as musical gifts of

love for God and neighbor alike. Ushers must "ush" for the glory of God. Acolytes, flower arrangers, communion preparers, and even those who copy and collate worship materials must do their holy work with passion, conviction, and joy.

Church growth gurus constantly claim that first-time guests already know, within ten minutes of walking through a church's front door, if they will return or not. First impressions are huge. And we make them only once. There are few second chances. But, remember, the biggest part of most first impressions is formed before the choir sings and the pastor preaches. In other words, most people know soon after finding a seat whether this church or that feels like a "good fit."

To me, that suggests that every person who has pledged to support Sudbury UMC by their "prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness" must also bring their A-Game to Christmas worship. When you see someone who might be a first-timer seated close to the pew where you typically sit, do your best to make him or her feel welcome. Do not ask, "Are you new?" Do not say, "I don't recognize you." Experiment with a greeting like this: "I've been trying to learn the names of all the people who sit near me in church and I wish I could remember yours." Wearing your name tag is also a good idea. Your name tag announces, "I am ready to be called by name. I am here to help you in whatever way I can."

A day or so after Thanksgiving, Wendy and I received a post card from Sudbury UMC. On one side, the definition of Christmas was written in old-fashioned Smith Corona type (that's a manual typewriter, for those who have always typed on a computer keyboard). On the other, a list of Advent and Christmas worship services invited new neighbors to come and check us out. Several of this month's first-time guests have mentioned receiving those post cards to me. If you got one, too, think of it as a reminder to join another Advent Conspiracy. Let's work together to make the holidays as inspirational and invitational as they can be when we're all "breathing the same air." That's what a conspiracy is! Face to face in our huddle, we all breathe the same Spirit!

And, by the way, let's remember to welcome our guests with optimism and hope because it is obvious that our conspiracy is working! Attendance and membership are up! And 2016, with 22 new members is, for the second year in a row, Sudbury UMC's growing-est year in this decade. Thanks, dear friends, for all you have done and for all you will do to reflect the light of Christ this weekend and next.

This year the Social Justice commission will lead book discussions on fiction and non-fiction literature dealing with critical social justice issues. Please join us as we hold our


first book group meeting in January followed by another in February. We are also asking for book recommendations for future group discussions.

#### **Health Ministries**

What is Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD)?

As winter approaches and the days get shorter, many people suffer with a form of depression called seasonal affective disorder (SAD). Although SAD isn't totally

understood, it is a real illness with real symptoms that vary in frequency and intensity. Symptoms can include:

- Sleep Problems Desire to oversleep, disturbed sleep or difficulty staying awake
- Lethargy A feeling of fatigue and inability to carry out normal routines
- Overeating Craving sugary or starchy foods
- · Social Problems Irritability and desire to avoid social situations
- Anxiety Tension and inability to tolerate stress
- Loss of Libido Decreased interest in sex or physical contact
- Mood Changes Extremes in mood and/or short periods of hypomania

One of the most effective treatments is light exposure. For mild symptoms, spending time outside and a good brisk walk may be enough. For more severe symptoms a light treatment called phototherapy may be helpful as it suppresses the brain's secretion of melatonin. People who think they may have SAD or any mental health issue should discuss their symptoms with a mental health professional.

#### How Faith Communities Can Respond

During the darkest nights of the winter, many faith traditions celebrate religious holidays. With SAD, as with all chronic mental illnesses and normal holiday stress, our faith communities can be intentional about finding ways to encourage a healthy winter holiday season that focuses on our faith, our families and our friends. Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ who will become the "light of the world." The eight-day Jewish celebration of Hanukkah is known as the Festival of Light. It reminds people of the miracle that re-kindled the Temple menorah light at a time of darkness and despair.

People living with SAD do not need to remain in the dark. SAD is a real and common disorder that can be effectively treated.
