

### FROM ZACK MOSER, YOUTH MINISTRIES DIRECTOR

The earliest memory that I have - as in, not a vague or general memory of a house or a pet, but the first specific moment of my life that I still vividly recall - happened in the back yard of the Clark Street United Methodist Church parsonage in Rocky Mount, NC. I had to be just two years old at the time (because we moved from Clark Street when I was two). The church (or a church, at least) was next door; easily seen from our back yard. More importantly, the steeple of the church was easily seen from our back yard. At its apex was a dark

brown, wooden, Celtic-style cross that towered into the sky, and it was terrifying.

I recall that as I was playing outside, and had the sudden realization that no one else was outside with me. My eyes darted upward to the steeple, and it looked back down on me with a menacing glare. The adrenaline coursed through my two-year-old body, and I sprinted toward the back porch, certain that I was doomed if I didn't make it inside right now. Inspired by abject terror, I shot across my back yard with - according to my memory - speed and agility quite uncommon to the average two-year-old. I ran up the steps as quickly as my feet would allow me to move, and that...is where the memory ends.

The first thing in my life that I remember doing is running away from the church. The interesting thing to note is that, whenever I thought someone else was in the back yard with me, I was never afraid. I ran away only when I realized I was alone.

Throughout my childhood and teen years, there was always someone around, so to speak; always someone to encourage/urge me to go to worship, church functions and youth group, and always someone through whom I could filter my experience. I never truly had to take ownership of my own faith, and ended up taking it for granted. Of course, I didn't see it that way at the time. Involvement in the church was a part of my life that I didn't question. I never considered the idea that I would ever fall away from it.

It was easy not to think about that in part because I was the son of two United Methodist pastors, but the truth is that for anyone growing up in a family committed to Christian discipline, it is easier to be involved in the church than not to be. It was simply part of my day-to-day life. I had friends in the church (of all ages), I liked singing hymns and listening to the choir, and youth activities were a lot of fun, particularly NC Conference camps and retreats that are scheduled throughout the year. Those had been important to me as a teen because they gave me that rare place where I was completely comfortable being myself. So there were plenty of reasons to be involved, but to be honest, it simply would have felt awkward not to go to church when the rest of my family did.

Then I left the proverbial nest. Suddenly, the commitment and the involvement became an option rather than a routine. Even though I never claimed to be anything other than a Christian - I never even claimed to be anything other than a United Methodist - as soon as those comfortable influences were not consistently present, I ran again. The difference is that I didn't realize it, nor did I have a destination. Back on Clark Street, I at least knew where I was headed: the safety of the back porch. Now that I had reached adulthood, I was just running.

Throughout the next roughly seven years of my life, my worship attendance was sporadic at best, and I bounced from one false source of fulfillment to another. I developed no concrete sense of direction or ambition for my life (even during graduate school), and as a result, my running turned into something more like treading water because I was headed nowhere; doing just enough with my life to avoid drowning. I didn't believe in myself, nor did I see any reason to. The only reason I did not completely give up on myself was that there were lots of people out there who did believe in me whose hearts it would have broken. Every single one of them was in my life because of the Church.

There were mentors and peers that I met through local, district and conference youth involvement. There were church members (from no fewer than 6 churches) who saw me grow up and had told me repeatedly that they saw a big future for me. There were folks four or five years younger than me who had looked up to me when we were youth and who saw me as a role model. Why did I not give up on my life? I would have let them down.

Finally, I stopped struggling and started listening. I started attending worship on my own every week, I reengaged myself in scripture (with particular focus on Paul's epistles), in daily prayer, and in the Christian community. About a year later, I felt a call into formal ministry. It was a call that may have started in my back yard when I was two. I had run for most of my life, but Christ doesn't stop calling, and God's love never gives up.

This is a call to teach and to love; a call to draw upon my own experience to share the Gospel with others who struggle to find peace in Christ, and I look forward to the new opportunities that God has in store for me and for Sudbury United Methodist Church.

So, another program year begins, and another choir year too. We're coming off a year in which, in addition to the anthems one might expect to hear during worship services, our choir "covered" works of the noted composers Dave Grusin (the adorable Christmas Eve piece "Who Comes This Night?" originally recorded by James Taylor), Sting ("Rock Steady", his take on the Noah's Ark story), Bill Withers (early last fall, "Lean On Me", remember?), and Michael Jackson ("Will You Be There?", with Iva singing Michael's part, on Music Ministry Sunday in June).

Which is to say: our first one of the year is slated for this Sunday. Without giving it away completely, I'll just say this ... it's got an appropriate message for the start of the Christian Education year ... and it's by Stephen Sondheim. (A tip of the cap to anyone who correctly guesses what song it is, ahead of time.)

So - see you Sunday, and ... well, see what you think.



October marks the start of Domestic Violence Month. This is but one of the many forms of violence, suffering, and division impacting our community, nation, and world in this moment. We are confronted by violence in rhetoric that dehumanizes and threatens entire groups of

people, and violence in our collective failure to respond with compassion to those among us who are struggling and hurting. Our faith traditions affirm that we belong and are accountable to one another. When any one of us suffers, all of us suffer. Our scriptures remind us of the vulnerability and tenacity of humankind, our faith traditions call us to work together towards creating a climate that is more than just the absence of violence. Building the beloved community calls us to be more, to work towards justice, wholeness, and soulful connection regardless of difference, to evolve beyond our base instincts. Creating peace in community is not a state we reach but an ongoing action. Responding violently is but one choice we have when we struggle with the real divisions that we experience.
